Module Aims
<p>The aim of the course is to examine the principles of micro-economic theory and to illustrate the application of theory to contemporary economic issues. Students will learn how to construct theoretical models from a varying set of assumptions. These models are applied to empirical situations and then related to contemporary debates and policy problems. The module provides the necessary foundation for further study of micro-economic principles and their application in Stages 2 and 3 of the undergraduate Economics degree.</p>

<p>The scope and method of economics; Determination of supply and demand; Elasticities; Consumer theory; Producer theory; Different forms of markets; Game theory.</p>

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy
<p>This module applies a blended approach (i.e., online + face-to-face), subject to Government and University policies. Lectures will outline and examine the key principles of microeconomics, supported with weekly seminars discussing key themes from the lectures of the preceding week. In the seminars, students will have the opportunity to apply microeconomic theory to economic, political, and social phenomena that occur in the real world. The progress of the students will be tracked by coursework in both semesters. Additional materials will be provided for students on the Virtual Learning Environment.</p>
